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Short Lives by Debra J. Gammons

I was looking through my Shakespeare book (*The Complete Signet Classic – Shakespeare*) searching for *Macbeth* when I discovered some of my old notes from one of my Music classes at the College of Charleston. I had notes on the artists and the music they had written, along with an analysis of various pieces. I also noted next to the artists' names their birth year and death year. One thing I noticed that did not strike me while in college was the relatively young ages of these magnificent and significant artists. Franz Schubert died when he was 31 years old; Robert Schumann was 46 years old when he died; Frédéric Chopin was 39 years old. Johannes Brahms was 64 years old when he died; Peter Ilyich Tchaikovsky was 53 years old; and Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart was 35 years old.

Even counting Brahms and Tchaikovsky, these people were young and, yet, they created amazing work that 200 years later we know and still enjoy. I realize in my amazement that the young age at which these people died is not unusual. People born in the 1800s and earlier did not live long lives. My amazement is in their accomplishments before their deaths. How many of us have reached or will reach the level of achievement of these artists? One wonders if these artists realized that they did not have much time. Did they experience a sense of urgency to create before time closed in on them?

William Shakespeare wrote more than thirty plays before he died at the age of 52. Most of his characters dealt with life and death situations and coming to terms with their decisions. When Macbeth learned that Lady Macbeth was dead, he lamented, "Out, out, brief candle! Life's but a walking shadow, a poor player/That struts and frets his hour upon the stage/And then is heard no more" *. Macbeth's view of life at this stage in his life is rather pessimistic. He has caused the death of many people; he is facing his own death; and Lady Macbeth is dead. He looks over his life and is saddened and angered. Life is too short for him. He could have continued to be a great leader but he allowed his jealousy, hunger for power, and greed to destroy him.

Too often, we think like Macbeth and complain that "[t]omorrow, and tomorrow, and tomorrow/Creeps in this petty pace from day to day . . ." Each day is like the next. We are stuck and do not know how to escape from our perceived trap. Our life span is significantly greater than those born in the 1700s. Today, is our expectation of a long life keeping us from making the most of each day?

We often reflect on our own lives when we face an illness or the death of a loved

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one. And we, like Macbeth, realize the brevity of life – “our hour upon the stage.” But, unlike Macbeth, we must ask ourselves, “What will I do with my hour? What will I do with my life? Do I want to be “heard” after I am dead, like Shakespeare, Chopin, Mozart, and Schumann? What will my legacy be? What will others remember about me?” In asking these questions, we will be creators in our own way like Shakespeare, Schubert, and Tchaikovsky. We will push aside mediocrity and move toward a better world for ourselves and those who live after us.

Greenville County Probate Court Launches Wills for Heroes by Probate Judge Debora Faulkner

The loss of nine firefighters in Charleston was a tragedy of immense proportion. The fire at the Sofa Super Store in Charleston on Monday, June 18, was the nation's deadliest single disaster for firefighters since the September 11 terrorist attacks. The ages of the firefighters ranged from 27 to 56.

Much too soon after the deaths, the families had to begin taking steps to settle the estates of their loved ones. Only two of those who perished had a will. Those with no Wills left loved ones who, in addition to having to cope with this tragedy, now have to endure the anxiety inherent in intestate administration. One of those firefighters without a will was Mark Kelsey. Mark had an ongoing loving relationship with Patty. She shared a home with Mark; she was his confidante and companion. Because Mark did not have a Will and the two were not married, Patty was left without any legal right to arrange his burial or retain any of his belongings. Friends are raising money to help her pay the bills that the two of them used to pay together.

Because this situation is all too common, I am launching a Wills for Heroes program consisting of a series of educational seminars for our Greenville County First Responders (EMS, firefighters, law enforcement), emphasizing the importance of having a properly drafted and executed Will and Power of Attorney. I am asking members of the Bar to donate one simple Will or basic Power of Attorney to a Greenville County First Responder. To sign up, please go to www.greenvillecounty.org/probate; then go to "First Responder" link. At my seminars, I will direct the First Responders to this website, where they will choose one of the volunteer attorneys for a basic Will or Power of Attorney. After you have donated your time for this effort, you can take your name off of our volunteer list by following the instructions on the website; or, if you wish to donate more than once, just leave your name on the list. This program will be in effect until October 1, 2008.

Mark Kelsey probably never anticipated the legal consequences of his decision not to have a will. I hope you will join me in this effort to educate and prepare our First Responders for what we all hope never happens.

JAMES R. MANN Attorney at Law



This interview was conducted primarily with Virginia Thomason Brunson Mann – wife, friend, and champion of James R. Mann. Mr. Mann was not able to fully participate in the interview.

Ms. Mann, How did you and Mr. Mann meet?

We met in Charleston. I grew up in Charleston. I was a student at the College of Charleston and Jim was at the Citadel. He graduated from the Citadel in 1941 and I was a 1942 graduate from The College.

Did he go to Law School right after graduation?

No, he went into the Army in 1941. He was on active duty until 1946.

When did the two of you get married?

We got married in 1945. Jim returned to South Carolina; then after our wedding, he had to return to the Army for ten months.

Where did Mr. Mann go to Law School?

He went to Carolina Law School. He started in 1946. We lived in a small one-bedroom house in Columbia. After our first child was born in 1946, we moved to a larger house but the accommodations were not much better than the one-bedroom house. We were poor but we didn't know it.

What did Mr. Mann do after Law School?

His Father was Alfred C. Mann, "A.C." He was a lawyer and former Mayor of Greenville. I think he was the Mayor in the 1930s. In the fall of 1947 Jim began practicing with his Father and Bevo Arnold. Later, he practiced with his brother, John Mann.

When did Mr. Mann run for political office?

He decided to run for the State House of Representatives in 1948. He called me in Charleston. I was there helping my Mom because my Daddy died. He told me he was going to run.

What did you say?

I said, "Okay."

How long did he serve in the State House?

Four years. He won two terms.

What were campaigns like?

Well, we went to a lot of stump meetings. You know what stump meetings were?

Yes, when I interviewed Judge G. Ross Anderson he explained to me about his going to stump meetings to campaign.

There was no television then. We went all over the area, usually at High School stadiums. Many people attended to see the candidates.

How did people learn about the stump meetings since television was not available?

Newspapers and radios. The newspapers would print a list of all the stump meetings and the candidates that would be attending. The candidates had to draw numbers to see in which order they would speak. You always hoped you would be one of the first so that you could make your speech then go home.

What did he do after serving in the House?

Jim was appointed by Governor Byrnes to complete the unexpired term of Bob Ashmore, Solicitor for the Thirteenth Judicial Circuit. Bob had been appointed to fill the unexpired term of Congressman Joe Bryson, who had just died. Jim served as Solicitor for one year under the appointment. Then he served two more terms after that. Jim had one investigator and one secretary.

Did Mr. Mann say anything about his years as Solicitor?

The worst cases were one where a man raped and killed a 16 year old girl. And one where a father was tried for the death of his child.

What did Mr. Mann do after serving as Solicitor?

He was on the Hospital Board and President of the Chamber of Commerce; he held many civic leadership positions. I remember, we were having dinner with friends and Jim said, "I think I'm going to run for Congress. I think I can beat E.C. Burnett." There was a Primary Election and Jim and E.C. were in the Run-off. Jim won.

Did he face any competition in the General Election?

Yes, Charlie Bradshaw was a young man running as a Republican. Charlie was a major owner of the Hardee's chain; he was known as "The Hamburger King." But he did not have any political experience. Jim won the Congressional seat.

How did you enjoy campaigning?

I thought it was awful. Our daughter, Virginia, was in Junior High School. We would go to different places to campaign for Jim and not everyone was friendly.

How did you celebrate that first victory in 1968?

We had an open house. People came over to our house that evening. We were living in this house; we have been here for fifty years.

How long did Mr. Mann serve in Congress?

From 1969 through 1979.

What was it like living in Washington, D.C.?

I did not move to D.C. We had two sons at the Citadel and one son and daughter at Greenville High School. Jim traveled back and forth from Greenville.

How did Mr. Mann enjoy serving in Congress?

He enjoyed it. When he stopped enjoying it, he did not run again. Charles Rangle served in the House with Jim. He and his wife, Alma, became good friends of ours. When Jim decided not to run again, Alma asked me, "Why is Jim giving up all of this?" I told her that Jim felt like he was not giving it his best and it was time to leave. He got tired of going back and forth from D.C. to South Carolina.

Did Mr. Mann sit down and talk with you about not

running again?

No. We were on a plane to Frankfurt, Germany when he told me.

Any particular recollections of Mr. Mann's time in Congress?

We attended the inaugurations of Richard Nixon, Jimmy Carter, and Gerald Ford. I would attend special events with Jim, especially Fourth District of South Carolina receptions. I remember that everybody liked Jimmy Carter. Patricia Nixon, Betty Ford, and Rosalyn Carter – all of them were very nice to me. While I was in D.C. I would do volunteer work with other wives of the Representatives or Senators. I worked in a homeless shelter answering telephones.

Who watched your two youngest children when you joined Mr. Mann in D.C.?

Jim's Mother watched them.

I understand that Mr. Mann served during Watergate.

Yes, he was in Congress during those Impeachment Hearings of President Nixon. Jim served on the House Judiciary Committee.

What did Mr. Mann do after serving in Congress?

He opened his own law office on East North Street.

What type of law did Mr. Mann practice?

Everything; a lot of family and criminal law. Mostly, *pro bono*. But it wasn't supposed to be that way. He just couldn't turn them down.

You have four children?

Yes, James, Jr., "Jim" has his Ph.D; he has served as a professor, curator at an art museum, and writer; Jim lives here with Jim and me. David works in real estate in Greenville. Virginia lives in Las Vegas. She started at Channel 21 in Greenville selling advertisements for television stations. She is the National Sales Representative for a television station in Las Vegas. William, the baby, worked with lighting in movies; he was living in California. He died in 2006.

How did you handle the grief of losing a child?

We just did what we had to do. You have things to do – even if it is just doing the laundry or buying groceries. It's not easy. I hated it for the children; they were all close.

Where was Mr. Mann's office when he practiced law?

He started out in the Lawyer's Building that was where the new portion of the Greenville County Courthouse is now. Then, he had an office on East North Street, diagonally across from the Law Enforcement Center. When he was a partner with Paul Foster, Reese Ashmore, and John E. Johnston, their office of Mann, Foster, Johnston, and Ashmore was in the area where the Hyatt is currently located; this firm disbanded when Jim was elected to Congress. Jim's last office was on Stone Avenue where Bozzie Boggs' office is currently.

Did Mr. Mann ever have Associates after Mann, Foster, Johnston, and Ashmore disbanded?

He did not have Associates. A lot of the young attorneys wanted him to hire them but he told them that paying the liability insurance and health benefits would have been too much. He let young attorneys use his office on Stone Avenue; he did not charge them any rent.

Who were some of those attorneys?
